

## Proposal: Optimizing Library Spaces for County Government

### Summary

The Prince George's County Memorial Library System (PGCMLS), with its network of conveniently located branches, offers a cost-effective and accessible platform for delivering County services directly to residents. This proposal outlines how County agencies and non-profit organizations can expand their reach by utilizing library spaces situated closer to the communities they serve. Included are branch capacities and examples of services that could be offered, such as tax preparation assistance, informational town halls, and workforce development programs. As PGCMLS is primarily County-funded, departments and Council members may use the space at no cost. Non-profit organizations may also offer essential community services free of charge through partnerships with the Library. By leveraging these existing resources, the County can reduce facility rental expenses while significantly improving service accessibility and community engagement.

## Introduction

Amid rising budget constraints and reductions in public services, Prince George's County must adopt innovative strategies to maintain and enhance service delivery. Leveraging existing government-owned spaces—such as public libraries—presents a practical and cost-effective solution. With branches distributed across the County, PGCMLS offers a unique opportunity to increase government visibility and engagement by bringing services directly into the heart of communities.

From property tax assistance to resume-building workshops, most County agencies can provide essential services more conveniently and equitably in pop-up locations in regional library branches. These smaller, community-based sessions allow services to be tailored to local needs while reducing operational costs and expanding accessibility. Nonprofits and other community stakeholders can also maximize their use of existing Library spaces to provide much-needed services to constituents.

The following proposal provides a list of Library branches, their location in the County, and their capacity. It also includes a sample list of resident-facing services that agencies may conduct in the branches, bringing the County government closer to our residents. Finally, the document includes existing policies and regulations and a brief explanation of how nonprofits may partner with the Library.

## Branches and Capacity

The following is a complete list of all PGCMLS branches and the approximate capacity each branch may have for events and public spaces.<sup>1</sup> Event space may also be available in the parking lots of certain Library branches.<sup>2</sup>

## Library Needs for Hosting Events

Depending on the size and nature of the event, PGCMLS may necessitate additional resources to provide staff and secure the buildings. These may include:



- Additional staffing complements to assist at events.
  - Staffing capacity at the area or system level to support the planning and coordination of partnered programs. The library system employs one full-time staff member dedicated to partnerships and outreach. Often, the demand for partnered programs and outreach requests exceeds the system's current staffing capacity.
- Security services for large events.
- Technology to support the events (ex., Smart Boards, AV Equipment).
- Overtime funding if events will exceed a branch's operating hours.

## Partnerships with Non-Profit Organizations

In addition to County agencies, non-profit organizations may partner with the Library to provide free services to residents.

PGCMLS provides opportunities for organizations to partner with the Library in a number of ways, including:

- Tabling at library branches
- PGCMLS participation at local events
- Local author expositions
- Programs, performances, and partnerships
