This Resolution is for the purpose of advising the Prince George's County Delegation to the Maryland General Assembly of the Council's concerns regarding electric utility deregulation in Maryland.

(Includes reason for proposal, as well as any unique statutory requirements)

The Maryland General Assembly is considering several bills which will deregulate Maryland's electric utility industry. There are at lease 13 bills currently pending before the legislature addressing this issue. They generally fall into two categories; one addresses the issue of deregulation and the other

addresses the issue of tax reform of the State's gross receipts tax on electric utilities as well as the restructuring of personal taxes for electric generation equipment.

Depending on the approach taken by the Maryland General Assembly, particularly with reference to the issue of tax restructuring, the result could be a decrease in County revenues.
