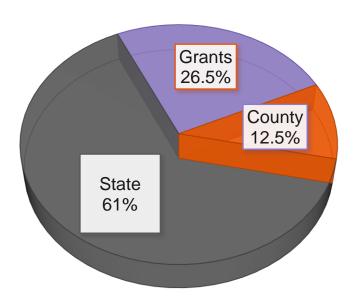

Customer Survey Pilot

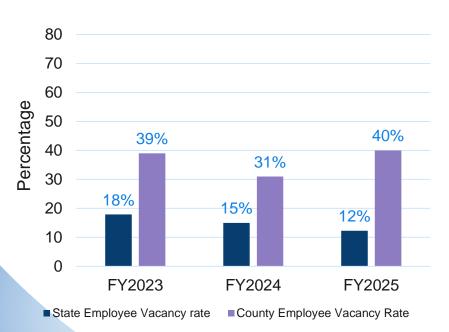

Bowie State University School of Social Work

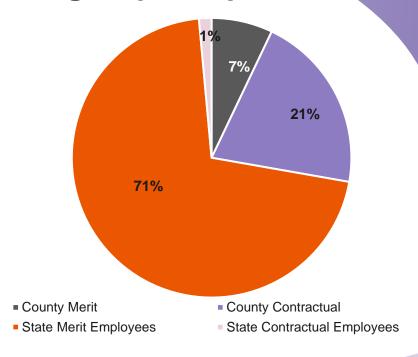

VITA Site

In support of the Governor's focus to leave no one behind and end childhood poverty, the Department's south county office has been selected as a Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) pilot site. This partnership between DSS, Maryland's Dept Community Services and Innovation, and Maryland Cash Campaign successfully brought this service to families accessing DSS benefits to assist in accessing deserved EITC and Child Tax credits.

Youth Drop In Centers

The two youth drop-in centers -YES focused on systems connected youth and BEZ focused on youth at risk of or experiencing a literal episode of homelessness - continue to serve as critical service connector points for disconnected youth in the community. The two centers have served 218 youth since inception.

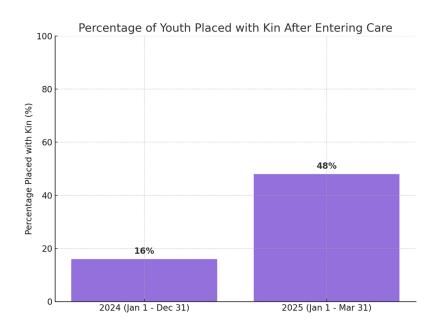
ENOUGH Grant

The Governor's Office on Children (GOOCP) awarded the Department of Social Services the Track 1 ENOUGH (Engaging Neighborhoods, Organizations, Unions, Governments and Households) grant to end poverty and our target area is Hillcrest Heights. This grant is the first of its kind, state led, place-based strategy to create poverty fighting opportunities driven by communities lived experience and expertise. As the Track 1 Quarterback, the focus is to build a community coalition for Hillcrest Heights. Our partners include Hillcrest Heights Elementary School, Benjamin Stoddert Middle School, the Civic Association as well as some other agencies that provide services in that area.

Kin First

On December 16, 2024, a new Kinship Policy was released that legally changes and clarifies the definition of kinship caregiver by including relations through blood, marriage, tribal law or custom, or cultural custom or practice. It also provides a preference for kinship caregiver placements which evidence demonstrates result in better outcomes for children. The changes establish the evidence-based framework for our "kin first" approach to out of home care. In an effort to support this new policy the Department created a Kinship Unit to provide specialized support and resources for kin placements. The Department currently has 13 children in kin homes. From January 1, 2025, to March 31, 2025, 27 entered care and 13 were placed with kin resulting in 48%. To date the kinship placements are trending in a positive direction.

The kinship team continues to work towards their licensing goals and 87% of families were licensed as of the end of February.



From January 1 to December 31, 2024, 85 youth entered care. 14 were placed with kin. (6%). From January 1, 2025, to March 31, 2025, 27 youth entered care. 13 were placed with kin (48%). This represents an 800% increase in kin placements.

Prevention Demonstration Program (PDP)

Partnered with Sasha Bruce Youthwork, Inc. to secure and HHS demonstration grant in the amount of \$464,928 over 3 years to design, deliver and evaluate innovative community-based **county** initiatives to prevent youth at imminent risk from experiencing literal homelessness. Strategies being tested include a peer coaching initiative, expansion of the agency's AFFIRM initiative to include all Continuum of Care providers, and three direct cash transfer models targeting youth and young adults ages 16-24. The state of Maryland recently approved an expansion of this project to include a cohort aimed at youth attending a Maryland university on the tuition waiver.



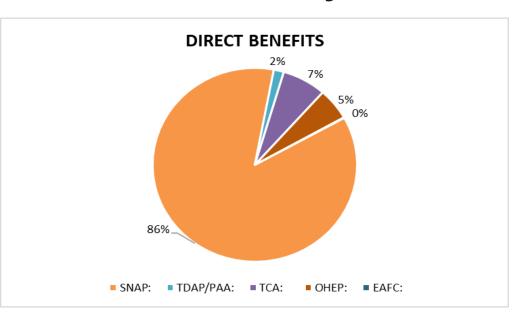
Youth Homelessness System Improvement Pilot (YHSI)

Partnered with the State of Maryland to secure \$2M over 3 years to plan, test and evaluate upstream prevention and intervention strategies that create **statewide** systemic change and prevent youth from experiencing homeless. Due to their level of expertise, the County's Youth Action Board (YAB) will be leading the State's efforts under this grant to develop and launch a statewide YAB.

10-Year Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness

Collaboration with more than 350 community partners to develop the County's 10-year plan to prevent and end homelessness. Phase 1 (System Assessment) concluded in November of 2024. Phase 2 (Plan development and publication) is on track for completion in June of 2025, and Phase 3 (Implementation) is scheduled to launch in July of 2025.

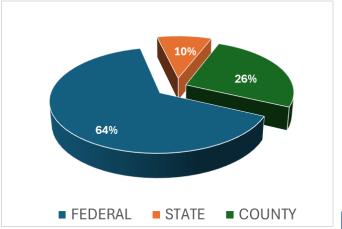

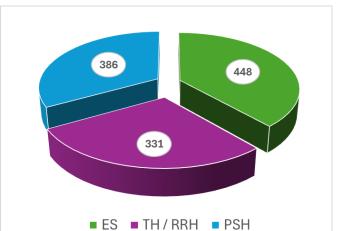
