The proposed legislation establishes a process to sell light wine and beer in grocery establishments. Often times, Prince George's residents must visit neighboring jurisdiction's to purchase beer and light wine. For the purposes of identifying access points to fresh food, a food retailer may be defined as a retail establishment that offers for sale food products in at least five of the following six categories: (1) fresh fruits and vegetables, (2) fresh and uncooked meat, poultry, and seafood, (3) dairy products and (4) canned foods, (5) frozen foods and (6) dry groceries and baked goods. Moreover, statistics show that Prince George's County has been hardest hit by the pandemic health wise are the same places where the County has the least access to primary care physicians and general health care. These areas are the same places to have the least access to healthy food. Lastly, grocers may be attracted to local supermarkets if they also sold beer and light wine, providing a one-stop shopping experience.

Mr. Albear facilitated a Powerpoint presentation titled, "School Pedestrian Safety Workgroup Final Report and Recommendations December 2024" which highlighted the following: Purpose; Background Information; Legislation; Workgroup Membership; Final Recommendations -Ensure Pedestrian Safety Infrastructure at the Time of School Construction; Initiate an Overall Evaluation of Accessibility Around PGCPS Schools; Establish a Unified "Walk Audit" Template for Prince George's County; Set Up Proactive Agency Coordination Meetings; Establish Safe Passage Coordinators; Create a Pedestrian Safety Risk Measure of Schools; PGCPS Set Internal Goals and Timelines to Complete Walk Audits in Their Schools; Board of Education Members Engage and Educate the School Community on Pedestrian Safety Work; Lower Speed Limits Around Schools; Improve Educational Campaign Around School Pedestrian Safety; Organize "Walking School Buses" to Reduce the Number of Families Driving Their Children to School; Establish Traffic Calming Infrastructure and/or Temporary Street Restrictions Around Schools During Drop-Off and Pick-Up Times; Actively Encourage School Principals to Innovate Ways to Reduce the Number of Drivers to Schools; Launch Annual PGCPS Youth Transportation Safety Summit in April 2025; For School Crossing Guard Coverage, Establish Subcontracting of Municipal Police Departments by the Prince George's County Police Department; Establish Walk, Bike & Roll to School Days and Ruby Bridges Walk to School Day (November 14th) as Official County & PGCPS Events; Collaborate with Prince George's County Arts & Humanities *Council to Create Walking Safety Signs and Artwork for Street Crosswalks;* Create Bilingual (English-Spanish) Pedestrian Safety Education in the Most Dangerous Areas in the County for Pedestrians; Useful Resources For Pedestrian Safety; and Acknowledgments.
