RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION concerning

Public Safety Involving Kias and Hyundais

For the purpose of encouraging the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to issue a recall of all Kias and Hyundais manufactured between 2011 and 2022, to request insurance companies' policies provide coverage on these vehicles and a statement of justification when coverage is denied for consideration of the County Council.

WHEREAS, the automakers Kia and Hyundai did not install industry-standard engine immobilizer technology on certain models between 2011 and 2022, resulting in millions of Kia and Hyundai vehicles being built without an anti-theft device that prevents the car from starting without the key or fob; and

WHEREAS, the residents of Price George's County Maryland have seen an increase in car thefts of Kias and Hyundais which contributes to a growing public safety concern of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Maryland Insurance Administration has been transparent in reporting that Kias and Hyundais vehicles continue to be stolen at alarming rates in Maryland and nationwide; and

WHEREAS, according to the Prince George's Police Department's 2023 statistics, the number of vehicles stolen and attempted stealing totaled 4,845, which rose to approximately 68% from 2022.

WHEREAS, according to the Prince George's Police Department's 2023 statistics, the number of juvenile arrests increased from 2022, culminating in the theft of 22 Hyundai and 21

WHEREAS, since January 1st of 2024, 470 Kias and 799 Hyundais for a total of 1,269 cars have been stolen accounting for 49% of all stolen cars; and

WHEREAS, according to the National Insurance Crime Bureau, a non-profit organization that tracks crime and fraud, more than 1 million vehicles were stolen across the country with Maryland as the second most drastic rise in thefts when compared to the previous year, with theft percentage increases of 63%; and

WHEREAS, in the State of Maryland, insurance companies are prohibited from denying coverage to policy holders or raising premiums for Kia and Hyundai vehicles; and

WHEREAS, if any Prince George's County resident who owns a Kia or Hyundai has been denied insurance coverage, may file a complaint through the Maryland Insurance Administration (MIA) on their website at https://insurance.maryland.gov/Consumer/Pages/FileACompliant.asps and;

WHEREAS, current Kia and Hyundai manufacturer's starting systems are not in compliance with federal standards and pose a great risk to public safety; and

WHEREAS, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has the authority to order recalls of passenger vehicles that do not comply with Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards (FMVSS) and/or that have a defect posing an unreasonable risk to motor vehicle safety; and

WHEREAS, these vehicles violate Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards (FMVSS), which provides vehicle performance requirements to reduce the incidence of crashes resulting from theft and accidental rollaway of motor vehicles. Specifically, it requires vehicles to have a starting system which, whenever the key is removed from the starting system prevents the normal activation of the vehicle's engine or motor; and either steering, or forward self-mobility, of the vehicle, or both; and

WHEREAS, the rampant theft of Hyundai and Kia vehicles makes it clear that these vehicles' starting systems do not prevent engine activation steering, or forward self-mobility when the key is removed from the starting system. Because the vehicles have easily bypassed ignition switches, a screwdriver and USB cable are sufficient to start and drive off with the cars in a matter of seconds or minutes—no key required. The lack of immobilizers in these vehicles, which could have provided a second line of defense against theft, has compounded, and

exacerbated this problem; and

WHEREAS, many of the Kias and Hyundai's vehicles lack engine immobilizers, antitheft devices that provide a second line of defense against theft by preventing vehicles from being started unless a unique code is transmitted from the vehicle key; and

WHEREAS, immobilizers have been industry standards for years, thus reducing rates of vehicle theft substantially; and

WHEREAS, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reports that thefts mainly ending in fatalities are on the rise because of keyed ignitions by our youth; and

WHEREAS, Hyundai's and Kia's planned service campaigns to provide software updates to a subset of affected vehicles is simply inadequate to remedy the safety issues presented by these vehicles; and

WHEREAS, a viral TikTok trend coined the "Kia Challenge" exposed Kia and Hyundai vehicles lack of an immobilizer, thus prompting Hagens Berman's class action lawsuit which brings up to \$200 million or more in relief for the owners of defected Kias and Hyundais. The video explains how to start Kia and Hyundai vehicles with a screwdriver and USB charging cord.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Prince George's House and Senate Delegations of the Maryland General Assembly encouraging them to issue a recall.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) urges an immediate recall of unsafe Hyundai and Kia vehicles manufactured between 2011 and 2022; that NHTSA shall produce yearly reports on Kias and Hyundais that are not manufactured properly and that lack engine immobilizers, ubiquitous antitheft devices that provide a second line of defense against theft by preventing vehicles from being started unless a unique code is transmitted from the vehicle key; and

BE IT FUTHER RESOLVED that the Prince George's County Police Department shall provide an annual report and present the report to the Prince George's County Council within 45 days of adoption of this provision on any thefts or attempted thefts involving juveniles and adults on any Kia or Hyundai in each Councilmanic district.
