PUBLIC SAFETY & FISCAL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT Date: 10/21/99

Committee Vote: Favorable, 5-0, (In favor: Council Members Wilson, Hendershot, Maloney, Russell and Scott).

This bill will allow elderly or disabled homeowners to defer, with interest at 9%, the increase in County property tax on the home as long as the owner occupies the home. The income eligibility cap is \$45,000. This compares to \$30,000 in Baltimore and Anne Arundel and \$60,000 in Montgomery County.

The fiscal impact on the County will be negative and the amount would depend on the number of homeowners who participate in the program, the value of each participant's property, the increase

in the value of each participant's property each year, and the tax rates applicable to the

participant's property each year. Based on the criteria for this program, approximately 10,650 homeowners could be eligible.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION/FISCAL IMPACT

(Includes reason for proposal, as well as any unique statutory requirements)

State law authorizes the County to provide for the deferral of a portion of real property taxes for elderly and disabled homeowners. The proposed legislation will allow owner-occupants whose income is not greater than \$45,000 per year to defer the amount of the increase in County property tax as long as they continue to live in the home.
