SECTION 1.	BE IT ENACTED by the County Council of Prince George's County,

<u>this Section.</u> (2) <u>Secu</u>	urity camera means an outdoor surveillance camera system, with functioning

1	digital video recording capability, that is installed on property owned or leased by an individual,
2	business, or nonprofit organization.
3	(3) <i>Priority area</i> means one or more locations that the crime driven data supports as
4	needing additional security cameras based upon public safety indicators, including crime levels.
5	Priority areas shall be identified and published by the Chief of Police and / or designee.
6	(4) Business means any association, corporation, partnership, individual, sole
7	proprietorship, joint stock company, joint venture, or any other legal entity through which
8	business is conducted as defined in County Code Section 10A-101(a)(4).
9	(5) <i>Subscription</i> means an amount paid regularly to receive a service or product.
10	(b) Program established. There is a Private Security Camera Incentive Program under the
11	partnership between the Prince Georges County Police Department and Office of Community
12	Relations. The Office of Community Relations will manage the marketing and outreach of the
13	Private Security Camera Incentive Program.
14	(c) Criteria to receive a camera, rebate, or voucher. An owner or lessee of a property may
15	qualify to receive a camera, rebate, or voucher under the program if:
16	(1) the applicant is an individual, business, or nonprofit organization;
17	(2) the property is located within a priority area;
18	(3) the applicant agrees in writing that the security camera must not be used for the purpose
19	of intentionally recording specific individuals conducting lawful activity on private
20	property not owned by the applicant;
21	(4) <u>business or non-profit applicants agree in writing to post notice prominently to alert</u>
22	visitors of the existence of the security camera;
23	(5) the rebate or voucher is used solely to offset the purchase of a security camera and/ or
24	the subscription costs associated with a security camera; and
25	(6) the application is submitted in the form and manner prescribed by the partnership
26	between the Prince Georges County Police Department and the Office of Community
27	Relations.
28	(d) Funding and limitations.
29	(1) The Director of the Office of Finance shall be responsible for dispersing rebates and
30	vouchers.
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1	(2) The amount of a rebate or voucher under the program must not exceed the purchase cost
2	of a security camera or the annual cost of a subscription for security camera service. The
3	maximum amount of a rebate or voucher shall be:
4	A. Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for cameras purchased by owners or lessees; and
5	<u>B.</u> One hundred dollars (\$100.00) for subscription costs.
6	(3) There shall be a limit of one (1) camera per residential household and two (2) cameras
7	per business.
8	(4) Rebates and vouchers provided under the program are subject to appropriation.
9	(5) The Office of Finance may seek federal or state funding to support the program.
10	(e) Priority Areas. Prior to implementation of the program, the Chief of Police and / or a
11	designee must provide a list of the priority areas in the County based on crime statistics. The
12	Priority Areas List shall be:
13	(1) identified by locations supported by crime driven data; and
14	(2) updated each year.
15	(f) Community Inclusiveness. This entire Section shall comply with Subtitle 2, Administration,
16	Division 46, of this Code.
17	(g) Annual report. The Office of the County Executive must report to the Council annually
18	regarding the implementation of the program, including the number and amount of rebates and
19	vouchers awarded, and the efficacy of the program.
20	Sec. <u>18-123</u> . through Sec. 18-132. – Reserved
21	SECTION 2. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that the provisions of this Act are hereby
22	declared to be severable; and, in the event that any section, subsection, paragraph, subparagraph,
23	sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Act is declared invalid or unconstitutional by a court of
24	competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the remaining
25	words, phrases, clauses, sentences, subparagraphs, paragraphs, subsections, or sections of this
26	Act, since the same would have been enacted without the incorporation in this Act of any such
27	invalid or unconstitutional word, phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, subparagraph, subsection,
28	or section.
29	SECTION 3. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that this Act shall be known as Jayz Agnew's
30	Law.
31	SECTION 4. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that this Act shall take effect forty-five (45)

calendar days after it becomes law.
