Federal Funding Sources - Entitlement Grants

- Fitle I Supports schools to improve the teaching and learning of children who are failing, or most at risk of failing, and are identified as living in high concentrated areas of poverty, as determined by approved student applications for free or reduced price lunch meals.
- Fitle II Support the increase of student academic achievement through strategies such as staff development which improves teacher and principal quality, that ultimately increases the number of highly qualified teachers in the classroom in core subject areas such as math, reading, social studies, and science.
- Fitle III Provides funding to ensure that Multilingual students attain English proficiency and meet the same challenging state academic content and achievement standards coupled with providing immigrant students with enhanced instructional opportunities.
- Title IV Provides students with a well-rounded education that promotes college and career readiness, STEM programs, academic enrichment, healthy student activities, drug and violence prevention, and the effective use of technology.
- > PERKINS Supports continuous improvement in Career and Technical Education.



Federal Funding Sources - Special Education

- Funding designed to assist educational agencies in reforming and improving their systems for providing educational, early intervention, and transitional services to students with disabilities.
- Regulated by the Individuals with Disabilities Act for infants and toddlers, and students in kindergarten through Grade 12, ensuring a Free Appropriate Public Education.
 - Part B Supplementary grants for preschool programs for children ages 3 through 5
 - Part C Early intervention services for infants and toddlers from birth to age 3
 - Part D National support programs administered at the federal level to improve education
- Medicaid Reimbursement for medically necessary school health services for students with an IEP
 - Speech therapy, occupational therapy, and physical therapy
 - Specialized transportation services for Medicaid-eligible students with special needs
 - School-based physical, mental, and behavioral health services
 - Administrative activities including outreach, enrollment, and service support.



Other Federal Funding Sources

- COVID Relief Grants Support instructional materials and curriculum delivery, new educational delivery models, student learning loss, technology access, mental and behavioral health and COVID-19 student and staff safety. Late liquidation of remaining grants through September 2025.
- JROTC Program Funding that enhances the leadership responsibilities and opportunities for student cadets with representation of four major branches of the military service. Local County match is required.
- Some competitive grants awarded have been affected by current executive orders / federal funding freeze.
- USDA reimbursement for the Free and Reduced Priced Meals program.
 - o In SY23-24, PGCPS received nearly \$60 million in federal reimbursements for meal programs.
