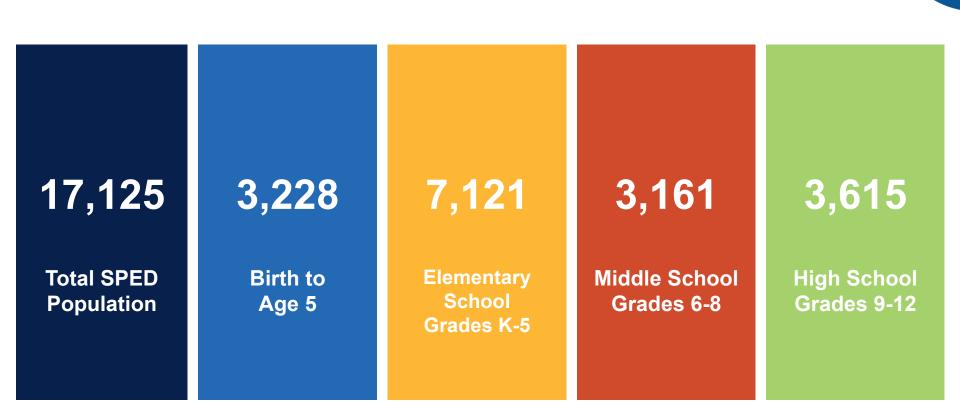

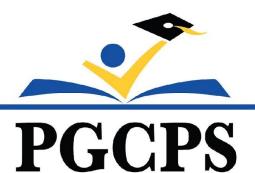

Early Intervention



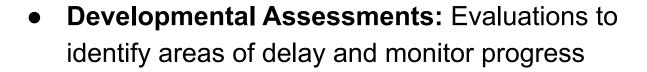
Early Intervention Services

- A system of services that supports infants, toddlers, and preschool-aged children with developmental delays or disabilities to promote growth, independence, and school readiness skills.
- Focuses on the critical years from birth to age
 5, when brain development is most rapid.
- Provides individualized supports tailored to each child's strengths and needs.
- Engages families as active partners and primary teachers in their child's development.





Early Intervention Services Provided





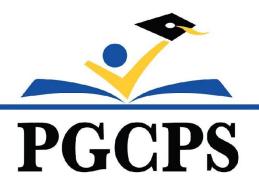
- Specialized Instruction: Individualized teaching strategies to address developmental delays
- Therapeutic Services: Including speech-language therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy and behavioral therapy
- Family Support and Training: Coaching and resources to empower families in supporting their child's development

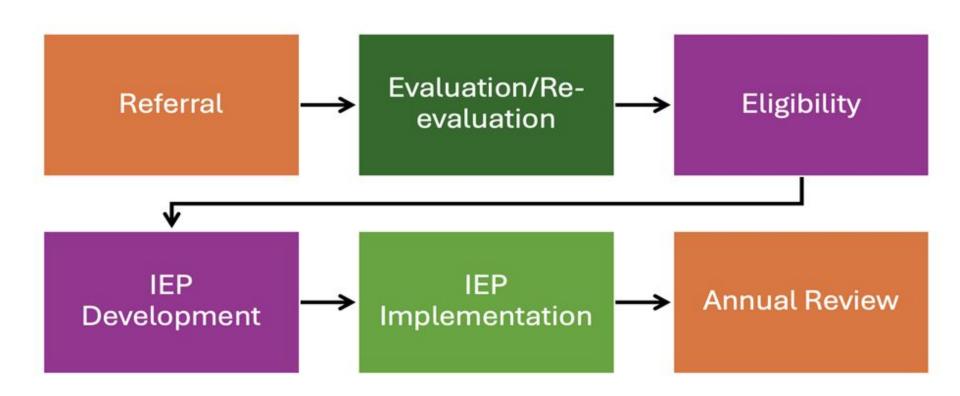

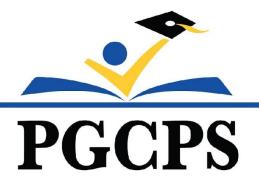


Transition to IEPs (Initial Eligibility Process)

Autism Programs

Autism programs provides specially designed instruction to students with autism in elementary, middle and high schools across the school district who are working toward a Maryland High School Diploma.

Core Features of the Autism Program:

- Social and Behavior Skills
- Self-Awareness
- Executive Functioning
- Evidence-based practices include: visual supports, task analysis, modeling, reinforcement, cognitive behavioral instructional strategies, and direct instruction.
- Students are taught to identify their feelings through <u>The Zones of Regulation</u>, a framework and curriculum that teaches students self-regulation strategies; use of sensory calming rooms.



Autism Extensions Program

The Autism Extensions Program provides specially designed instruction for students with autism spectrum disorder who also have a significant cognitive disability and intensive behavioral needs. Students are working toward a Maryland High School Certificate of Completion.

Core Features of the Autism Extensions Program:

- Social Skills, Self-Awareness, Executive Functioning
- Use of instructional strategies based on the TEACCH framework
- Functional life skills embedded within the school day
- Evidence-based practices include: visual supports, task analysis, modeling, reinforcement, cognitive behavioral instructional attractions, and direct instruction.

Post-High School Transition Supports

According to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)

The term "transition services" means a coordinated set of activities for youth with disabilities that:

- Is designed to be within a <u>results-oriented</u> process, that is focused on improving the academic and functional achievement of the child with a disability to facilitate the child's movement from school to post-school activities.
- In Maryland, all students with IEPs must have a transition plan by age 14.

Secondary Transition Services



Each student's secondary transition plan must document how a student will participate in the following areas:

- Postsecondary education
- Career training
- Integrated employment
- Adult services
- Independent living
- Community participation
