Who is COC?

The Common Ownership Communities Unit (COC) was established in 2007 by the Prince George's County Council via CB-015-2007. Mission

Mission

COC is charged with assisting governing bodies, owners, and residents of homeowners' associations, residential condominiums, and cooperative housing corporations with education, training, and alternative dispute resolution services in matters relating to the management of these communities.

What is a Common Ownership Community?

A common ownership community is identified as a Condominium, Homeowners' Association, or a Cooperative Housing Corporation. The main difference is type of ownership.

Types

Condominium

Owners own their interior space and share into the common elements with others.

Cooperative Housing Corporation

The shareholder does not own real estate, but rather a share in the legal entity that owns the real estate. The corporation owns the land, buildings, and common areas.

Homeowners' Associations (HOA's)

The owner owns their home and in most cases a portion of the common areas. HOA's are governed by written Declarations of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions



Shared Benefits

Property Values

Having standards on neighborhood upkeep and the presence of amenities can increase property value.

Beautification

Binding rules on architecture and property help reduce neighbor conflict.

Amenities

Sharing the cost of common spaces allow for amenities single owners may not have access.

Fractional Ownership

The ability to own fractional residential property (Condos and Coops) increase opportunity for ownership.

There are an estimated **365,000** HOA's in the United States.*

State of Maryland has **7,100** Common Ownership Communities.*

Prince George's County COC has more than **950** registered Common Ownership Communities.

Homeowners' associations account for about 58-63%; Condominiums account for 35%-40%, and cooperatives account for 2-4% of community associations.



Lack of community participation Community members do not actively engage in training or community meetings where Association business is discussed. **Common concerns** Board Member elections, financial transparency, lack of required meetings, lack of maintenance, lack of information during new development.
