RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION concerning

Maryland Neighborhood Partnership Program – Housing Initiative Partnership, Inc.

For the purpose of approving the project submitted by the Housing Initiative Partnership, Inc.

(HIP) to the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development for participation in the Neighborhood Partnership Program.

WHEREAS, Article 83B, Section 4-701 through 4-706 of the Maryland Annotated Code established the Neighborhood and Community Assistance Program, which includes the Neighborhood Partnership Program to assist nonprofit organizations in carrying out approved projects in designated revitalization areas, to encourage businesses to invest in designated revitalization areas, and to strengthen public-private partnerships; and

WHEREAS, Article 83B, Section 4-705 (c) of the Maryland Annotated Code provides that the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development may not approve a proposal for participation in the Neighborhood Partnership Program unless the proposal is approved by the governing body of the county in which the designated revitalization area benefited by the project is located; and

WHEREAS, the Housing Initiative Partnership, Inc., (HIP) a nonprofit organization, proposes to expand its affordable homeownership program entitled HIP HOMES; and

WHEREAS, HIP acquires dilapidated, vacant single family homes in distressed inner-Beltway communities; and

1	WHEREAS, working closely with the community, HIP substantially rehabilitates these	
2	homes and sells them to first time homebuyers earning 80 percent or less of the area median

4	WHEREAS, HIP proposes to acquire dilapidated single family homes in Palmer Park and	
5	Seat Pleasant and substantially rehabilitate these homes and sell them to first time homebuyers	
6	earning 80 percent or less of the median income, the "Project"; and	
7	WHEREAS, HIP has applied to the Maryland Department of Housing and Community	
8	Development for approval of the Project for participation in the Neighborhood Partnership	
9	Program; and	
10	WHEREAS, the County Executive expresses approval of the Project, as described above.	
11	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the County Council of Prince George's	
12	County, Maryland, hereby expresses approval of the Project, as described above submitted by the	
13	Housing Initiative Partnership, Inc., (HIP) to the Maryland Department of Housing and
