



FY 2020-2023 COMMUNITY GRANTS PROGRAM

Through a competitive program, PGAHC's Community Grants Program provides project grants for artists, arts organizations and public entities providing arts programing in the County. It is the **only local source of funding for individual artists to apply for funding**.

DEVASTATION OF COVID-19 TO ARTS COMMUNITY *TRENDS FROM FY 2020–FY 2023*

- **FY2020** Received \$230,322 in requests and 16 grants totaling \$59,000 were awarded. \$50,000 of Grant Funds were reallocated to first round of Emergency Grants, totalling \$78,840. (See Emergency Arts Relief)
- **FY2021** Received over a 50% increase in requests totaling 483,000 and 43 grants totaling \$200,013. Arts-in-Education is lower due to COVID-19 restrictions at PGCPS. Artist Fellowships had a 300% increase in applications totaling nearly \$350,000 in requests. Highest year ever in requests and awards, and awards were made in every District and discipline.
- **FY2022** Lost \$200,000 in Council Non-D Funding. Limited program in one (1) category, Arts in Education offered, Received \$120,460 in applications and awarded 10 grants totaling \$32,000 from Special Appropriations Grants. No funding for Artist Fellowships.
- FY2023 No Council Non-D Funding. Limited program to move forward with \$50,000 National Endowment (NEA) Regranting Award. No funding for Artist Fellowships.









Launched in 2016, the Prince George's Film Office provides full comprehensive services to the film industry looking to film in Prince George's County and the County's growing cluster of emerging film production, entertainment, and related companies—several of which recently have gained national recognition. Its focus is to highlight County assets, as well build the capacity of this industry sector to increase the County's revenue and employment opportunities – all which were negatively impacted by the pandemic.


The economic impact/ROI for film productions have a proven multiplier affect -- increasing related revenue generation through film screenings, spending with local businesses and boosting the tourism industry. (Maryland State Industry Coalition)

The FY22 ecomonic impact is the conservative estimated spend in Prince George's County from film projects last year. As productions are increasing in budget size and scale this will increase significantly.

FILM GRANTS PROGRAM



The inaugural film grants program launch in April of 2022 funded by the County's ARPA grant received over \$2.2 million in grant application requests in two rounds of grants, showing the critical need for financial support for filmmakers.




