For the purpose of adopting with amendments the Fiscal Year 1999-2000 Operating and Capital					
Budgets of the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission and the recommended Water and					
Sewer Rates and Ad Valorem Tax Levies for the Fiscal Year 1999-2000.					
WHEREAS, Section 1-204 of Article 29 of the Annotated Code of Maryland establishes a					
procedure for the preparation, review and approval of the annual capital and operating budgets of					
the Washington S	Suburban Sanitary Commission, and fur	ther provides for recommendations by			
the Montgomery	and Prince George's County Councils re	egarding the rates for water consumption			
and sewer usage charges and the ad valorem tax levies of the Commission; and					
WHEREAS, the Montgomery County Council on October 27, 1998, by Resolution No.					
13-1483 and the Prince George's County Council on October 28, 1998, by Resolution No.					
CR-81-1998, established the following spending control limits for the Fiscal Year 1999-2000

WHEREAS, on March 1, 1999, the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission submitted to the County Executives of Montgomery and Prince George's Counties its proposed capital and operating budgets for Fiscal Year 1999-2000; and

WHEREAS, the Proposed Capital and Operating Budgets for Fiscal Year 2000 submitted by the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission were in compliance with all spending control limits established by the Montgomery and Prince George's County Councils except for water and sewer operating fund expenditures; and

WHEREAS, the Commission forwarded to the County Executives of both Counties the record of the public hearings held by the Commission regarding its budget proposal; and

WHEREAS, the County Executives of Montgomery and Prince George's Counties transmitted their recommendations on the Commission's proposed budget, including the record of the public hearings held by the Commission, to the respective County Councils; and

WHEREAS, the Prince George's County Council, upon due public notice, held a public hearing on the Commission's proposed budget on April 6, 1999 at which interested persons were given an opportunity to be heard by the Prince George's County Council; and

WHEREAS, the Prince George's County Council, following review of said budgets, approved on March 25 and April 8, 1999, proposed additions to, deletions from, increases and decreases from items contained in the proposed budgets and transmitted these proposed changes to the Montgomery County Council on May 11, 1999; and

WHEREAS, the Prince George's County Council received on May 11, 1999, from the Montgomery County Council its approved proposed additions to, deletions from, and increases and decreases from items in the Commission's proposed budgets; and

WHEREAS, on May 13, 1999, the Montgomery and Prince George's County Councils jointly reviewed the respective proposed additions to, deletions from, and increases and decreases regarding items in said submitted capital and operating budgets and further considered all proposed changes;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Council of Prince George's County, Maryland, that the following amounts and positions, or as much thereof as may be necessary to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby approved for the budget of the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999 and ending June 30, 2000:

11	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Capital and Operating Budgets hereby adopted				
12	include the following change to the proposed budgets as recommended by the respective County				
13	Councils; and				
14	Decreased the Capital Budget by \$4,	,838,000 to reflect chang	es in Fiscal Year 2000

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in implementing the above reductions in the operating budget, the Commission shall establish its work program priorities within the dollar and workyear levels approved herein, taking into consideration the recommendations approved by the Prince George's County Council at the May 13, 1999 Bi-County Council meeting; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Commission in accordance with the actions and recommendations of the two Counties hereby approves a cost of living adjustment for all employees. This adjustment shall occur in two increments: a \$638 increase in base pay effective the first pay period ending after July 1, 1999, and a \$637 increase in base pay effective the first pay period ending after January 1, 2000; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Commission shall implement a comprehensive customer information program on meter replacements to ensure that customers whose meters are replaced are aware of the potential for large bill increases. Additionally, data from meter replacements will be collected in such a manner as to facilitate the development of information on customers consumption changes; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Commission develop a clear method of identifying all savings from the Competitive Action Program (CAP), discuss the methodology with the two counties during the next Spending Affordability process, and incorporate this methodology as a section in future Commission budget documents. Additionally, the Commission shall develop a long-term plan for implementation of the CAP with clear goals set for related reductions in each year; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Commission provide the Council with a 20 year projection of available funds in the General Bond Debt Service Fund to understand any long term impacts on the Reconstruction Debt Service Offset (REDO); and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Commission is restricted to use of only the \$16,401,000 budgeted for PAYGO funding in Fiscal Year 2000 and that any proposal to increase this amount must be approved by the Commissioners during a regularly scheduled Commission meeting; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in adopting its Fiscal Year 2000 Operating Budget the Counties and the Commission recognize that although total operating debt service is \$215,756,000 and equals 48.4% of the total operating budget, water and sewer operating debt service, the portion of debt service supported by water and sewer rate revenues, is \$144,274,000 or 38.7% of the water and sewer operating budget; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Counties recommend that the Commission establish a process to require the General Manager to bring transfers of \$500,000 or more in spending authority for any capital project to the Commission for review and approval of the increases and decreases proposed; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Counties recommend that the existing System Development Charge Policies be reviewed in the context of the estimated six year funding gap to determine if their is a need to close the gap with rate supported debt due to the shortfall in the System Development Charge revenues; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Prince George's County Council joins with the Montgomery County Council in recommending to the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission the following:

- 1. Rate for Water Consumption: zero increase
- 2. Sewer Usage Charge: zero rate increase

3. The Water and Sewer Use Charges will be based on a water production rate of 166 million gallons per day; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any supplements to the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission's Approved Fiscal Year 2000 budget shall be in accordance with the provisions of Section 1-204 of Article 29, Annotated Code of Maryland; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Commission acknowledges the recommendations of the respective County governing bodies regarding certain policies, procedures, and practices and will take the following actions concerning them:

- 1. Obtain the approval of both County Councils before increasing operating expenditures above \$445,946,000.
- 2. Obtain the County Council's approval prior to making any transfer of funds from any of the approved expenditure categories within the operating and capital budgets in excess of five percent (5%) of the approved amounts. The amount approved for debt service is excluded from this transfer authority.
- 3. Furnish monthly status reports to each County Council and County Executive as to the fiscal and budgetary activities of the Commission pursuant to the Approved Operating and Capital Budgets, commencing with the end of the first quarter of the fiscal year. These reports shall be submitted not more than 45 calendar days after the close of each month.
