A RESOLUTION	concerning	
	Black Maternal Health Week	
For the purpose of recognizing April 11 -17 <sup>th</sup> as the annual Black Maternal Health Week; to		
oring county wide attention to maternal health crisis in the United States and the importance of		
educing maternal	mortality and morbidity among Black women and birthing persons.	
WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Black women in		
the United States are 2.6 times more likely than White women to die from pregnancy-related		
causes; and		
WHEREAS, Black women in the United States suffer from life-threatening pregnancy		
complications, known as maternal morbidities, twice as often as White women; and		
WHEREAS, the United States has the highest maternal mortality rate among affluent		
countries, in part because of the disproportionate mortality rate of Black women; and		
WHEREAS, the rate of preterm birth among Black women is nearly 50 percent higher than		
the preterm birth rate among White or Hispanic women; and		
WHEREAS, the high rates of maternal mortality among Black women span across income		
evels; education levels; and socioeconomic status; and		
WHEREAS, an investment must be made in maternity care policies that support and		
promote affordable, comprehensive, and holistic maternal health care that is free from gender		
and racial discrim	ination	

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Council of Prince George's County, Maryland, that week of April 11-17<sup>th</sup> shall be recognized annually as the Black Maternal

Health Week.

BE IT FUTHER RESOLVED THAT Black Maternal Health Week is an opportunity to deepen the national conversation about Black maternal health in the United States; amplify community-driven policy, research, and care solutions; center the voices of Black mothers, women, families, and stakeholders; provide a national platform for Black-led entities and efforts on maternal health, birth, and reproductive justice; and enhance community organizing on Black maternal health.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT in order to improve maternal health outcomes, the County Council must fully support and encourage policies grounded in the human rights, reproductive justice, and birth justice frameworks that address Black maternal health inequity.
