RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION concerning

Adequate Public Safety Response Time Test Task Force

For the purpose of establishing the Adequate Public Safety Response Time Test Task Force to thoroughly examine the methodology, data accuracy, and real-world application of the existing response time test and recommend necessary revisions or alternatives that more effectively align with public safety goals and current resources.

WHEREAS, CR-080-2025 (DR-2) was adopted on July 8, 2025, to suspend the current police response time calculations temporarily and directs the Planning Board to temporarily use the most recent response time data sent by the Chief of Police prior to the January 2025 Report to determine adequacy for new residential development; and

WHEREAS, the resolution also requires the County Executive to work with the Prince George's County Planning Department in consultation with the County Council to develop best practices and guidelines within fifteen days to determine a mitigation fee schedule to improve police response times; and

WHEREAS, there are numerous issues surrounding the Police Response Time Test since the enactment of CB-089-2004 and CB-056-2005, as well as the requirement of the payment of the public safety surcharge for which all new residential construction must pay, the County Council desires to temporarily suspend the most recent police response time calculations required under Section 24-4508(b)(2)(B) of the Subdivision Regulations until the methodology or current police response time calculations can be more thoroughly reviewed and evaluated for accuracy and/or adjusted to address the ongoing issues associated with the current police

response time test; and

WHEREAS, Prince George's County is approximately 499 square miles; is made up of diverse urban, suburban, and rural areas; and has varying crime rates throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, as administered, the current police response time test/methodology fails to consider multiple incorporated municipal jurisdictions within the County that have their own Police Departments; and

WHEREAS, the Council finds it is necessary to study the methodology and review the police response time data to determine inaccuracies, inconsistencies, and/or incongruent application or results; and

WHEREAS, Section 506 of the Charter for Prince George's County provides that the County Council may appoint, for designated periods, one or more temporary advisory boards of citizens of the County, who shall assist in the consideration of County policies and programs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Council of Prince George's County, that the Adequate Public Safety Response Time Test Task Force is hereby established.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the membership of the Adequate Public Safety Response Time Test Task Force shall consist of nine (9) members, selected by the Chair of the County Council, to include the following:

- 1. Two (2) representatives of the County Council, appointed by the Chair of the County Council, shall serve as Chair and Vice Chair of the Adequate Public Safety Response Times Test Force;
- 2. One (1) representative from the Office of Chief of Police or designee;
- 3. Four (4) community leaders from various districts representing civic associations or public safety advocacy organizations;
- 4. Two (2) representatives from the residential or commercial development community appointed by the Office of County Executive.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the mission of the Adequate Public Safety Responses
Time Test Task Force shall be to review the history, purpose, and implementation of the current
police response time test; evaluate the methodology and data sources public used by the Police
Department; assess the technological and operational capabilities of the current dispatcher
system, solicit community input and identifying public safety concerns related to development
and recommending updates or alternatives to the response times test that reflect modern practices

2	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council Administrator shall provide staff for	
3	the Adequate Public Safety Response Time Test Task Force.	
4	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Adequate Public Safety Response Time Test	
5	Task Force shall convene within 30 days of adoption and deliver a final report with findings and	
6	recommendations to the County Council within six months.
