A FOCUS ON NEIGHBORHOODS


The Community Foundation determined priority neighborhoods and areas following review of data from sources such as the US Census Bureau and in partnership with MWCOG. We utilized the Equity Emphasis Areas and worked with Brookings to overlay:

- High Poverty
- Lowest levels of home
- Lowest life

Because our strategy focused on economic mobility, we also prioritized the blue and purple line corridors where appropriate

Prince George's County

- Langley Park, Chillum, Adelphi (Purple Line)*
- Seat Pleasant, Largo Corridor (Blue Line)*
- Suitland, Branch Avenue, Pennsylvania Avenue



INTERVENTIONS FOR CLOSING THE RACIAL WEALTH GAP

We will continue the work to address basic needs and strengthen our region's capacity to respond to crisis, as we work to advance economic mobility, and create opportunity for individual and community wealth building. Informed by almost 50 years of grantmaking and broader community leadership work in the region, we have framed a full spectrum of interventions that can help us achieve this end.

PROVEN STRATEGY

The Stockton Economic Empowerment Demonstration (SEED) established in 2019, Stockton, CA, is the most well-known pilot. The program provided unconditional cash transfers to 125 people over a two-year period. Participants experienced:



Decrease poverty by as much as 40%



Reduce stress and improve mental health



Reduce income volatility and boost employment



Build savings needed to weather financial crises



PROGRAM OVERVIEW



\$4 million investment of public and private philanthropic resources

TARGET POPULATIONS



Seniors
(Age 60+)

Senior Citizens: Seniors, particularly those on fixed incomes, often lived precariously pre-pandemic, but now they are finding it even more difficult to make ends meet due to inflation, historical inequalities, the rising costs of healthcare, and ageism in the workplace. 51% of seniors in the county live below the ALICE threshold.

Youth aged out of foster care

Youth Aged Out of Foster Care: Far too many foster care youth in Prince George's County age out of the foster care system without finding a stable and permanent home. Studies have shown that those who age out of foster care are more likely to face socio-economic challenges including homelessness, early pregnancy, and involvement in the criminal justice system. The challenges facing youth aged out of foster care were further exasperated by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Up to 175 Seniors and Youth participating in the program. 125 Seniors & 50 Youth.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Our eligibility criteria help to ensure that the County's most vulnerable residents, within our target populations, are identified. Prior to the development and launch of Thrive Prince George's, The Community Foundation conducted an analysis of the Greater Washington region to identify areas where it would prioritize efforts as part of its strategic plan. This analysis included a review of data from sources such as the American Community Survey, provided by the US Census Bureau. Zip codes were selected as priority areas based on several factors including but not limited to population size, poverty rate, education attainment, homeownership, and employment. While some of the selected zip codes are in the proximity of the Blue Line, the foundation's priority areas are based on zip code only and not on their proximity to the Blue Line.

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNERS



CASA, established in 1977, has served youth experiencing foster care in Prince George's County for over two decades. Each year their staff and volunteers advocate for about 200 young people to receive the services and resources they need to succeed and ensure the rights of all children in foster care.



UCAP, established in 1964, is one of the largest nonprofit organizations in Prince George's County. It was designated as the Community Action Agency for Prince George's County in 1978. UCAP serves approximately 4200 low-to-moderate income individuals and families each year that are facing educational, housing, economic, or health care related hardship.



Capital Area Asset Builders (CAAB) works to create opportunities for low- and moderate-income individuals in the region. Since 2017 CAAB has worked with over ten guaranteed income programs in the region. They will offer technical assistance on cash disbursements and guidance on best practice.



Prince George's Changemakers has long advocated for the adoption of a guaranteed income program in Prince George's County. They are a member of the Prince George's GBI Coalition and will assist with community engagement and advocacy efforts around policy change. Lastly, our community engagement partner will help advance an advocacy campaign to scale the pilot.

PROGRAM EVALUATION

Using both quantitative and qualitative measures of progress, we will work with Brookings Institute to measure how the economic status of participants improves over time including outcomes such as:

- Changes in income volatility
- Changes in wellbeing (physical health and mental health)
- Personal development, training, and capacity building
- Changes in employment
- Optimism about the future
- Changes in how participants use their time
- Participant narratives signaling how the GI has affected their live
