SECTION 1	. BE IT ENACTED by the County Council of Prince George's County,	
Maryland, that Sections 20A-213, 20A-214, 20A-215, <u>20A-215.01</u> , 20A-216, 20A-217, and		
20A-218 of the Prince George's County Code be and the same are hereby added:		
SUBTITLE 20A. TRANSPORTATION.		
	DIVISION 3. PUBLIC TRANSIT AUTHORIZATION.	

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Section 20A-213. Purpose and Intent. 1 2 The purpose of this Act is to facilitate equitable access to public transportation by creating a 3 structured process through which public transit providers may request access to private property to install, maintain, or continue a public bus stop, subject to legislative approval. This Act seeks 4 5 to balance the transportation needs of County residents with the property rights of private 6 owners. 7 Section 20A-214. Definitions. 8 (a) For the purposes of this Act, the following definitions shall apply: 9 (1) **Public Transit Provider** means any regional or local public transportation 10 agency, including the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA), Prince 11 George's County DPW&T TheBus, or their designees. 12 (2) **Private Property** means land owned or controlled by a non-governmental entity, 13 including apartment complexes, private developments, commercial centers, or private roads not 14 otherwise dedicated for public use. (3) **Transit Access Permit** means the formal approval issued pursuant to a County 15 16 Council Resolution authorizing a public transit provider to operate a stop on private property. 17 Section 20A-215. Application and Review Process. 18 (a) A public transit provider may submit a Transit Access Application to the Department of 19 Public Works and Transportation (DPW&T), requesting permission to access private property 20 for transit service. 21 (b) The application shall include: 22 (1) A detailed description of the proposed stop location; and 23 (2) Documentation of existing or anticipated ridership volume; and 24 (3) A safety and feasibility assessment conducted by the transit provider; and 25 (4) A summary of prior use (if any) of the location as a public bus stop; and 26 (5) Proof of notification to the property owner, including the proposed site plan and 27 rationale. 28 (c) Within 30 days of receipt, DPW&T shall: 29 (1) Review the application for completeness and accuracy; and 30 (2) Notify the property owner of their right to submit a written response or objection 31 within 30 calendar days; and

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1	(3) Refer the application and any owner response to the County Council for
2	consideration.
3	Section 20A-215.01. Consent, Authorization, and Service.
4	(a) Locating bus stops on private property is a collaborative effort between the County, the
5	property owner, and the public transit provider.
6	(b) Locating bus stops on private property requires property owner consent and public
7	transit provider approval.
8	[(c) In the event of a disruption in service, a public transit provider shall make a good faith
9	effort to provide shuttle service to the nearest Metro station.]
10	Section 20A-216. Transit Access Permit Approval.
11	(a) The County Council may, after considering the application, any written responses, and
12	the public interest, and upon property owner consent and public transit provider approval, adopt
13	a Resolution authorizing the issuance of a Transit Access Permit.
14	(b) The Council may impose reasonable conditions upon the permit, including hours of
15	operation, noise mitigation, signage, or maintenance responsibilities.
16	(c) As part of approving a permit, if the property owner does not allow bus service, when
17	the Council adopts a permit Resolution, the Council can mandate that the applicant provide
18	shuttle service to the nearest Metro station.
19	[(c)] (d) Upon adoption of a Resolution, the permit shall be deemed approved and the
20	transit provider may proceed with installation and operation of the bus stop, consistent with the
21	terms of the permit.
22	Section 20A-217. Property Owner Rights and Protections.
23	(a) This Act does not grant a permanent or transfer of ownership rights to the transit
24	provider.
25	(b) The transit provider shall indemnify and hold harmless the property owner from
26	liability for injuries, damages, or claims arising directly from transit operations on the site, to the
27	extent permitted by law.
28	(c) The County may offer mediation services if a dispute arises between a property owner
29	and a transit provider.
30	Section 20A-218. Implementation and Regulations.
31	(a) DPW&T, in consultation with the Office of Law, shall develop implementing

1 regulations, including application forms, review standards, and a model indemnity agreement, 2 within 90 days of the effective date of this Act. 3 (b) DPW&T shall publish an annual report to the County Council summarizing all applications received, permits issued, and transit stop locations approved under this Act. 4 5 SECTION 2. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that the provisions of this Act are hereby 6 declared to be severable; and, in the event that any section, subsection, paragraph, subparagraph, 7 sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Act is declared invalid or unconstitutional by a court of 8 competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the remaining 9 words, phrases, clauses, sentences, subparagraphs, paragraphs, subsections, or sections of this 10 Act, since the same would have been enacted without the incorporation in this Act of any such 11 invalid or unconstitutional word, phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, subparagraph, subsection, 12 or section. SECTION 3. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that this Act shall take effect forty-five (45) 13 14 calendar days after it becomes law. Adopted this 17th day of November, 2025.
