 Antiretroviral Therapy(ART) ensures that individuals living with HIV lead a long life.

• Undetectable = Untransmittable (U=U)*

 Cannot be spread through casual contact or sharing utensils.

 Untreated STIs (especially syphilis) increase HIV risk.




HIV Data Collection

- Most of the current data is from 2022.
- Data may change throughout the year, based on provider reporting.

8,045 people living with HIV in Prince George's County








Who is most impacted by HIV in Prince George's County?



Viral Load Suppression



HIV & STIs are Preventable



- Condoms
 - Correct use prevents HIV and STIs
- Pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP)
 - For those who do not have HIV
 - Daily pill or one shot every 2 months
- Post-exposure Prophylaxis (PEP)
 - Must be started within 72 hours of a possible exposure
- Treat STIs
 - Get tested
 - Untreated STIs increase risk of acquiring HIV

GOAL:

75% reduction in new **HIV** infections by 2025 and at least reduction by 2030.

Ending the HIV Epidemic in the US (EHE) provides resources to 50 local areas where more than half of new HIV diagnoses occur. In total, these priority areas include 48 counties, Washington, D.C., and San Juan, Puerto Rico. EHE also provides resources to seven states with a substantial rural burden.



Diagnose all people with HIV as early as possible.

Treat people with HIV rapidly and effectively to reach sustained viral suppression.





Prevent new HIV transmissions by using proven interventions, including pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) and syringe services programs (SSPs).

Respond quickly to potential HIV outbreaks to get needed prevention and treatment services to people who need them.








Campaign Highlights Since 2021

- Content that engages specific groups like ages 18-34, black heterosexual men, LGBTQ community, immigrants, and women.






Positive Voices Podcast
