Supporting Our Community Through the COVID-19 Crisis

Through the COVID-19 Emergency Response Fund, The Community Foundation coordinated the region's largest philanthropic response effort focused on meeting the urgent needs of families and communities hit hardest by the pandemic and economic crisis.

Our work resulted in:

- \$11 million in community support mobilized for this region
- 300 nonprofits received funding to stabilize and expand their programs
- **300,000+** people received support and services
- **57%** of nonprofits partners are led by people of color
- \$80+ million in aligned giving from funds at The Community Foundation

A Vision for Economic Justice in the Greater Washington Region

Our Community Leadership Goals

- Pursue Economic Justice by investing in strategies to increase economic mobility and close the racial wealth gap.
- Address Critical Community Needs, including responding to crises, to stabilize and improve the quality of life for our neighbors and communities.
- Strengthen Neighborhoods and Community Institutions by using data to direct resources toward neighborhoods with the greatest needs and the BIPOC-led community organizations that serve them.
- **Connect Philanthropy to Impact** by leveraging our unique value and expertise to mobilize resources for this community.





Why the Racial Wealth Gap?

Greater Washington is home to **nine of the 20 wealthiest counties** in the United States — but families in our community are not equally sharing in this wealth. By almost every measure — education, income, housing, health, and wealth — BIPOC communities are significantly lagging behind their White neighbors.

In DC, White households have 81 times more net worth than Black households.

- In Fairfax County, if racial income gaps were closed, its gross domestic product would increase by \$26.2 billion a year.
- Prince George's County has the lowest median household income in the region, despite being one of the wealthiest Black jurisdictions in the country.
- In Montgomery County, the homeownership rate for White people is almost 60% compared to 12% for Latinx people, 14% for Asian people, and 18% for Black people.

History Tells Us that Our Region's Racial Wealth Gap Won't Close Itself.

Greater Washington isn't unique in facing these disparities. Yet, what sets us apart is the stark inequities that have led to some of the nation's wealthiest zip codes being just a short drive from some of its poorest.

Now is the time for bold action and transformational change.

Seizing this opportunity to change the prospects for how Black and Brown people in our community generate, sustain, and share wealth, will open the door to addressing every other disparity affecting them and our entire community. In turn, we would improve the quality of life for everyone who lives, works, and raises a family here.

Guaranteed Basic Income Overview

- Monthly, cash payments given directly to individuals.
- Maximize flexibility for families who are spending the money.
- Meant to supplement, rather than replace the existing social safety net.





Guaranteed Basic Income Results

Reduce income volatility

Reduce stress; improve mental health

- Build savings needed to weather a financial crises
- Time & resources available to pursue education, training, and/or entrepreneurial pursuits





The Community Foundation joined with several regional foundations to launch Let's GO DMV!, a 5-year guaranteed income pilot providing \$1,000 a month to 75 hospitality workers, like Venorica "Vee" Tucker, who lost their jobs during the pandemic.





Guaranteed Basic Income Our Plan

- Grow & share learning from current investments in DC and Northern Virginia (Arlington)
- Pursue new pilots in Montgomery and Prince George's Counties
- Advocate to scale efforts across the region
