CR-23-1998 expresses the Council's support of proposed congressional legislation to limit the

authority of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) from preempting local zoning authority and safety and environmental standards. The sponsor of CR-23-1998, further explained that since the Federal Communications Act of 1996, the FCC has been promulgating regulations which have the effect of diminishing local land use prerogatives. CR-23 encourages the Maryland Congressional delegation to support the proposed legislation.

The County Executive supports and the Acting County Auditor finds that there should not be any negative fiscal impact on the County as a result of adopting CR-23-1998.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION/FISCAL IMPACT

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) is considering rules which would preempt local land use, safety, and environmental standards and procedures in the location of a new generation of communications towers to be constructed in the next 4 years for digital television antennae. The United States Congress is considering legislation to limit the FCC's authority in this area. The proposed resolution expresses the Council's support and encourages the Maryland Congressional Delegation to support the proposed legislation.
