SECTION 1.	BE IT ENACTED by the County Council of Prince George's County,
Maryland, that Sect	tions 2-508.1, 2-508.2, 2-508.3, 2-508.4, 2-508.5, 2-508.6, 2-508.7, 2-508.8
and 2-508.9 of the F	Prince George's County Code be and the same are hereby added:
	SUBTITLE 2. ADMINISTRATION.
	DIVISION 42A. RESILIENCE HUBS.
Sec. 2-508.1. Defin	ition.
(a) Resilience	e Hub shall mean community-serving facilities augmented to support

residents, coordinate communication, distribute resources, and reduce carbon pollution while enhancing quality of life. Resilience hubs provide an opportunity to effectively work at the nexus of community resilience, emergency management, climate change mitigation, and social equity while providing opportunities for communities to become more self-determining, socially connected, and successful before, during, and after disruptions.

- (b) Resilience hubs are used to support residents and coordinate resource distribution and services before, during, or after a natural hazard event. These resilience hubs will also provide a central location for residents impacted to gain immediate access to existing County and State government resources to aid in the overall community's recovery. They leverage established, trusted, and community-managed facilities that are used year-round as neighborhood centers for community-building activities. Resilience hubs can equitably enhance community resilience while reducing GHG emissions and improving local quality of life. They are a smart local investment with the potential to reduce burden on local emergency response teams, improve access to health improvement initiatives, foster greater community cohesion, and increase the effectiveness of community-centered institutions and programs.
- (c) Resilience hubs provide an opportunity to build local community power and leadership. They are focal points for neighborhood revitalization that provide the resources residents need to enhance their own individual capacity while also supporting and strengthening their neighborhood and neighbors. Instead of being led by local government, they are intended to be supported by local government and other partners but led and managed by community members, community-based organizations, and/or faith-based groups.

Sec. 2-508.2. High Priority Locations for Resilience Hubs.

- (a) It is the County's goal to prioritize and establish at least ten resilience hubs in climateimpacted vulnerable communities by 2030.
- (b) The County shall use existing maps, energy resilience zones, equity emphasis areas, thermal mapping, and other relevant map layers, to prioritize the ten locations.

Sec. 2-508.3. Identification of Partner Organizations.

The County shall identify partner organizations based on the needs of the resilience hubs from the private sector, the non-profit sector, as well as, from federal, state, local and municipal governments. The County shall identify likely partners based on the priority areas. Several partner organizations may need to be identified in each resilience hub priority zone.

Sec. 2-508.4. Requests for Proposals. 1 2 Requests for proposals shall be issued for targeted community partners to assist in locating high 3 priority locations for resilience hubs. Identifying multiple potential locations for each resilience 4 hub priority zone may be necessary. 5 Sec. 2-508.5. Community Engagement. 6 (a) The County shall engage the community to assist in designing and maintaining resilience 7 hubs. 8 (b) The County shall tailor programs and services offered by each designated resilience hub 9 to meet the community's needs. (c) There shall be a community-specific approach utilized by the County to first engage with 10 11 stakeholder residents through workshops, surveys, and other means to assist in gaining support 12 and consensus in identifying specific resilience hub locations. 13 (d) The County shall partner with equity organizations within vulnerable communities which 14 may be cash strapped and/or place greater priority of investing available resources on the 15 community's existing issues which may be considered more critical to everyday life versus 16 investment in preparing for future impacts of climate change. 17 (e) To put equity at the center of implementation, the County shall engage directly with the community to inform the community of the location, design, and services of resilience hubs. Multi-18 19 lingual workshops should be provided based on specific community demographics. The creation 20 and location of resilience hubs should be considered part of every economic redevelopment plan 21 for equity areas. Specific consideration shall be given of how to provide timely support for 22 businesses within vulnerable communities to remain open for services and solvent after a natural 23 hazard event. 24 Sec. 2-508.6. Streamlining Permitting and Code Compliance. 25 The County shall streamline the County's permitting and code compliance for all resilience hub 26 related improvements. 27 Sec. 2-508.7. Resilience Hub Innovation and Entrepreneurship.

- 28 The County shall incubate resilience hub innovation and entrepreneurship through public-private
- 29 partnerships by incorporating resilience hub locations into the County's Economic Development
- 30 Plans.

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Sec. 2-508.8. Funding Strategies.

1 The County shall co-develop funding strategies with resilience hub partners. Different partners 2 may have access to different funding sources, and a co-proposal may appeal to many funders. Funding strategies should include the MEA Resiliency Hub Grant Program and grant funders 3 which have a traditional interest in supporting vulnerable communities, disaster preparedness, the 4 5 environment, and energy. The County shall consider the role of financial incentives for a publicprivate partnership to retrofit existing facilities more quickly into resilience hubs. 6 7 Sec. 2-508.9. Incentives.

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The County shall reward participating businesses or other participating entities through public recognition, fee and tax reduction incentives, and other available incentives.

SECTION 2. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that the provisions of this Act are hereby declared to be severable; and, in the event that any section, subsection, paragraph, subparagraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Act is declared invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the remaining words, phrases, clauses, sentences, subparagraphs, paragraphs, subsections, or sections of this Act, since the same would have been enacted without the incorporation in this Act of any such invalid or unconstitutional word, phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, subparagraph, subsection, or section.

SECTION 3. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that this Act shall take effect forty-five (45) calendar days after it becomes law.
