CORE SERVICES

- Providing 9-1-1 call center services, including the dispatch of emergency calls to the appropriate public agencies
- Providing functionality of body worn cameras, in car cameras, public safety records management systems (RMS),
 mobile data computers and ensuring secure video storage for all public safety agencies
- Protecting communities by coordinating and integrating all activities necessary to build, sustain and improve the
 capability to mitigate against, prepare for, respond to and recover from health and threatened or actual natural
 disasters
- Provide responses to Maryland Public Information Act (MPIA), subpoena, and public safety agency investigation requests for 9-1-1 and dispatch text or audio recordings

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

Administration Office is responsible for the overall management, coordination and direction of the Office of Homeland Security.

The Public Safety Communications Division is responsible for the 9-1-1 center and support of certain public safety technology. The 9-1-1 center provides emergency call services to citizens and dispatch services to the appropriate public safety agencies. The division also supports certain public safety technology systems including radio communications equipment, in-car cameras and the mobile data computer information system maintenance and consolidates storage of body worn camera footage.

Prince George's County Charter

Pursuant to the section 14 of the County Charter, the Office of Homeland Security was established. The Office is composed of Public Safety Communication, and an Office of Emergency Management. The Office of Homeland Security is responsible for management of an integrated public safety and emergency communication system. The Office is also tasked with providing planning, coordination, domestic preparedness training and coordination of the County's emergency management effort with Federal, State and local jurisdictions.

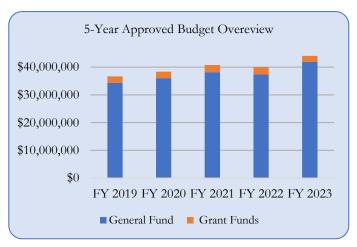
The Emergency Management Operations Division is responsible for the County's emergency and disaster preparation and coordination of public safety agencies.

FY 2023 TOP PRIORITIES

- Plan, support and implement 9-1-1 diversion of behavioral health-related calls for services.
- Develop plans to meet service level demands, staffing requirements and equipment enhancement associated with Next Generation 9-1-1.
- Fulfill the Office of Homeland Security-related Police Reform Taskforce recommendations.
- Maintain joint incident management with the Health Department during the pandemic response and recovery, coordinating vaccination management, planning, resource acquisition and coordination of testing and vaccination sites throughout the County with the help of the Health Department.
- Implement and exercise the County's Continuity of Government (COOG) and agency Continuity of Operations Plans (COOP); in keeping with industry, municipal and state practices.

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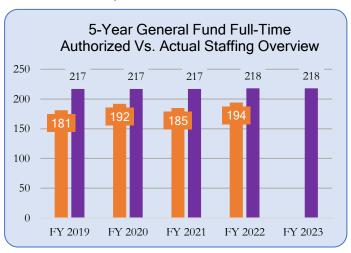

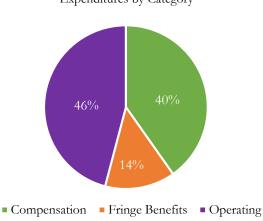

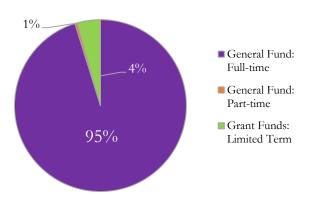


FY 2023 Approved General Fund Expenditures by Category
