#### **FY 2024 County Aid Summary**

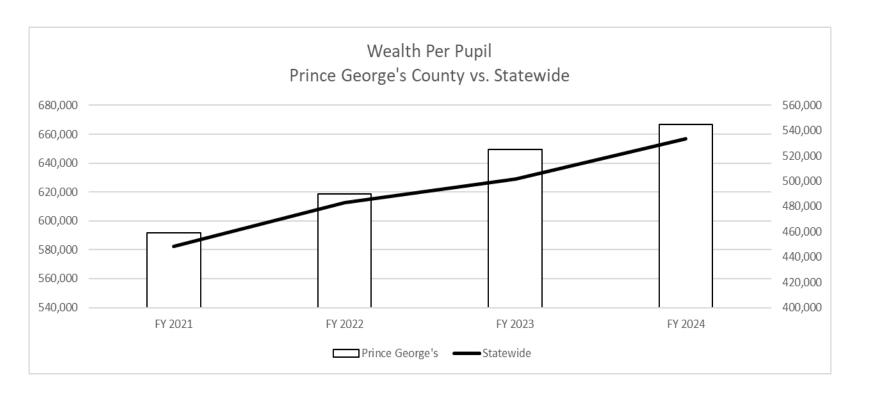
- State aid to/on behalf of Prince George's County totals \$1.92 billion in FY 2024.
- Direct Aid increases by \$250.7 million, or 16.2%.
  - K-12 education aid increases \$190.4 million, or 14.1%.
  - Library aid grows \$23,520, or 0.3%.
  - Community College aid increases by \$2.4 million, or 5.3%.
  - County aid increases by \$57.9 million, or 14.3%.

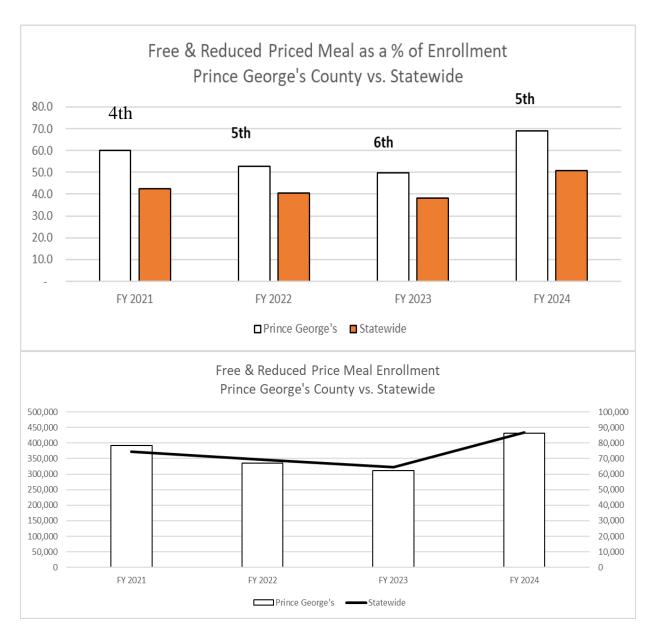
### Drivers of K-12 Education Funding: Wealth Per Student

- County wealth increases 3.8% in FY 2024 compared to the statewide average of 4.4%.
- The County ranks 15<sup>th</sup> on wealth per student, the same level as FY 2023.



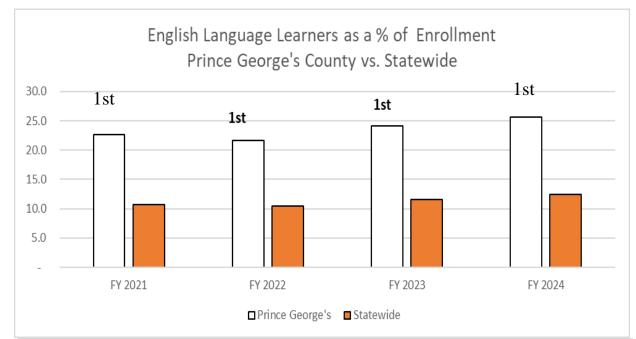
#### **Drivers of K-12 Education Funding: Free and Reduced-Price Meals**

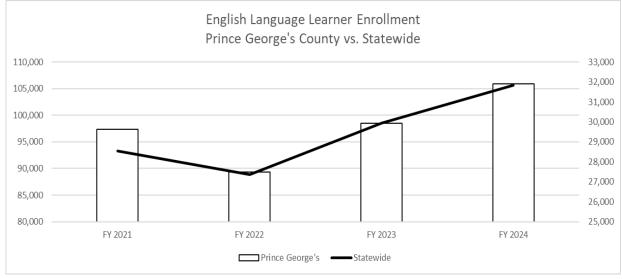
- The County ranks 5<sup>th</sup> in the number of students who qualify for free and reduced-price meals as a percent of enrollment.
- FRPM student counts have increased sharply following a period of federal funding for meals for all students during the pandemic, when FRPM students were not counted.



#### Drivers of K-12 Education Funding: English Language Learners

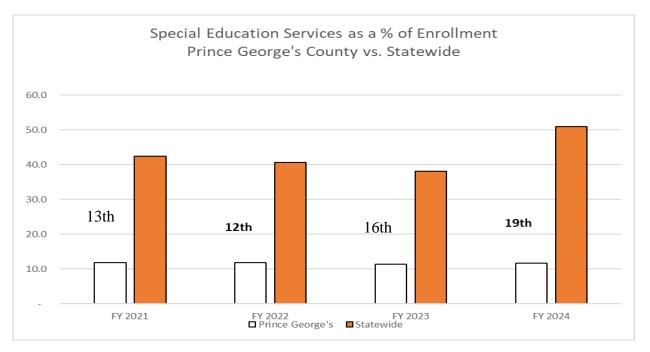
- The County ranks 1st in the number of students who are English Language Learners as a percent of enrollment.
- ELL student counts have also grown in the last two years.

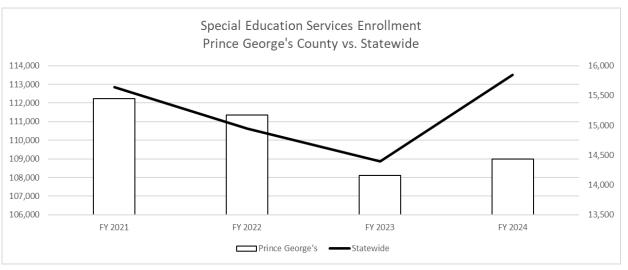




#### **Drivers of K-12 Education Funding: Special Education Services**

- The County ranks 19th in the number of students who receive Special Education Services as a percent of enrollment.
- Statewide growth in students receiving Special Education services has growth faster than the County.
- The County had ranked 13<sup>th</sup> as a percent of enrollment in FY 2021.

## **Other Legislation**

## Military Retirement Tax Exemption HB 554

• Governor Moore has proposed legislation to exempt military retirement income from the income tax. It would exempt \$25,000 of income in TY 2023 and \$40,000 in TY 2024 and beyond.

• The impact to the State General Fund is estimated at impact estimated at -\$33 million in FY 2024.

• County income tax revenue would be reduced depending on the number of resident retirees.

# Extension of the Refundable Earned Income Tax Credit HB 547

- The Governor plans to introduce legislation to maintain the Refundable Earned Income Tax Credit at 45% of the federal earned income tax credit.
  - Chapter 39 of 2021 had increased the Earned Income Tax Credit from 28% to 45% for Tax Years 2021 and 2022.
  - The cost to the State is estimated at -\$151 million annually.
  - A credit on State taxes should not affect County revenues.
  - The legislation would benefit low-income residents in every County.

#### Child Care Tax Credit HB 547

• Governor Moore also announced plans to propose legislation to establish a more robust Child Care Tax Credit.

• The revenue loss to the State is -\$20.0 million annually.

• A credit on State income taxes should not affect County revenues.
