For the purpose of requiring	certain businesses that operate between 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
to obtain a late-night safety	plan from the Office of the County Executive, or their Designee;
that requires the business to	obtain an approved late-night safety plan before operating; that the
business must operate under	the terms of the approved late-night safety plan; that an approved
late-night safety plan authori	izes the business to operate for three (3) years; that at the expiration
of the three (3) period the b	usiness will need to obtain a new approved late-night safety plan;
and that businesses operating	g without an approved late-night safety plan are subject in a civil
fine for each day it operates	without an approved late-night safety plan.

SECTION 1. BE IT	ENACTED by the County Council of Prince George's County
Maryland, that Sections 5-1	67 through 5-167.06 of the Prince George's County Code be and the

4	Sec. 5-167. <u>D</u>	efinitions [Reserved].
5	<u>(a) In th</u>	nis Division the following words and terms shall have the denoted meanings:
6	<u>(1)</u>	Business means any place of commerce or commercial activity operated by a
7		person and open to the public, including but not limited to: retail, service,
8		entertainment, professional, lodging, food and beverage, cannabis, cigarette or
9		liquor sales establishments. Business does not include hospitals or any health care
10		<u>facilities.</u>
11	<u>(2)</u>	<b>Department</b> means the Office of the County Executive, or one or more offices or
12		departments designated by the County Executive.
13	<u>(3)</u>	Late-Night Business means any Business that is:
14		(A) open to the public at anytime between 10:00 PM and 6:00 AM; or
15		(B) open to the public at any time between 10:00 PM and 2:00 AM and, within the
16		previous 12 months, has been the subject of two (2) or more service calls for
17		law enforcement regarding alleged serious incidents occurring on or originating
18		from the premises.
19	<u>(4)</u>	Late-Night Safety Plan means a plan approved by the Department in accordance
20		with this Division.
21	<u>(5)</u>	Person means:
22		(A) an individual; or
23		(B) a partnership, firm, association, corporation, or other entity of any kinds; or
24		(C) a receiver, trustee, guardian, personal representative, fiduciary, or
25		representative of any kind.
26		(D) Exclusion: Person does not include, unless otherwise expressly provided, a
27		governmental entity or an instrumentality or unit of a governmental entity.
28	<u>(5)</u>	Priority Area means one or more police response areas where Late-Night
29		Businesses and the surrounding community would benefit by operating in
30		accordance with a Late-Night Safety Plan as identified and published by the
31		Department, based upon public safety indicators to include, but not limited to:

1			(A) crime levels;
2			(B) emergency calls; and
3			(C) non-emergency calls.
4		<u>(6)</u>	Relevant Departments mean the Prince George's County Police Department, the
5			Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of Permitting,
6			Inspections, and Enforcement, Department of Health, the Regional Service Centers,
7			and the Board of License Commissioners.
8	Sec. 5-10	<u> 57.01</u>	. Prohibition, authorization.
9	<u>(a)</u>	<u>A p</u>	person shall not operate a Late-Night Business without first submitting a proposed
10		Late	e-Night Safety Plan to the Department.
11	<u>(b)</u>	<u>A p</u>	person may only operate a Late-Night Business after the Late-Night Safety Plan is
12		<u>app</u>	roved by the Department and only in accordance with the Plan.
13	<u>(c)</u>	A L	ate-Night Safety Plan expires three (3) years after its approval, and after such time a
14		Late	e-Night Business must obtain a newly approved Late-Night Safety Plan from the
15		<u>De</u> r	partment in order to continue operating in the County.
16	Sec. 5-10	<u> </u>	. Requirements and promulgation.
17	<u>(a)</u>	The	Department, after consultation with other Relevant Departments, shall promulgate
18		rule	s and regulations to implement the mandates of this Division.
19	<u>(b)</u>	That	t the rules and regulations implemented by the Department shall:
20		<u>(1)</u>	establish the methodology used to identify a police response area as a Priority Area;
21		<u>(2)</u>	establish the process for the owner or operator of a Late-Night Business to submit
22			a proposed Late-Night Safety Plan;
23		<u>(3)</u>	establish the process for the Department to consider and approve, after consultation
24			with other relevant departments, a proposed Late-Night Safety Plan;
25		<u>(4)</u>	establish a process for the Department and with other relevant departments to
26			provide training to business regarding safety and to periodically verify compliance
27			with an approved Late-Night Safety Plan;
28		( <u>5</u> )	establish a template that a Late-Night Business must use to submit a proposed Late-
29			Night Business Safety Plan; and
30		<u>(6)</u>	establish the minimum requirements of a Late-Night Safety Plan:
31			(A) which shall require:

1	(1) an emergency evacuation plan;
2	(2) 24-hour contact information for the business owner or manager;
3	(3) Exterior bathroom doors that are free opening at all times, if the
4	bathroom facilities use bathroom stalls;
5	(4) An acknowledgement that the business has received late night business
6	training from the County; and
7	(B) may require, with written justification, any or all of the following:
8	(1) security training and security personnel physically present on or about
9	the Late-Night Business's premises during the hours of 10:00 PM and
10	<u>6:00 AM;</u>
11	(2) exterior lighting;
12	(3) high-definition digital security cameras that provide video monitoring
13	and recording, without audio recording capacity, or the interior and
14	exterior of each entryway into the Late-Night Business and the cash
15	register(s) or till(s).
16	(c) Security Camera Requirements. If a Late-Night Safety Plan requires the use of security
17	cameras, then the Late-Night Safety Plan shall also require that the Late-Night Business
18	owner or operator post signage in a conspicuous location on the interior and exterior of
19	the business notifying the pubic that the Late-Night Business is subject to video
20	surveillance monitoring.
21	(d) The Department may recommend, but must not require, that a Late-Night Business:
22	(1) search patrons by the use of mental detectors, magnetometers, or pat downs; or
23	(2) provide video recordings to the Department or other relevant departments, except
24	when otherwise required by law.
25	Sec. 5-167.03. Appeals.
26	A Late-Night Business may appeal the disapproval of a plan or the identification of a business
27	as a late-night business as defined above, to the Board of Appeals.
28	Sec. 5-167.04. Penalty.
29	Any violation of this Division shall subject owner and/or operator of a Late-Night Business
30	to a fine of not more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000); and each day the Late-Night Business
31	operates in violation of this Division is a separate offense.

## Sec. 5-167.05. Grant Program. 1 2 (a) Program established. There is a Late-Night Business Safety Plan grant program. 3 (b) Eligibility requirements. A Late-Night Business may qualify to receive a grant under the 4 program if: 5 (1) the grant is used solely to offset the costs of implementing an approved or 6 recommended late night business safety plan; and 7 (2) the grant application is submitted in the form and manner prescribed by the 8 Department. 9 (c) Funding Limitations. (1) Grants under the program are subject to appropriation. 10 11 (2) The Department must prioritize awarding grants to late night businesses that require 12 plans over those recommended plans. (3) The Department may seek federal and / or state funding to support the program. 13 14 Sec. 5-167.06. Annual Reporting. 15 The Department must provide an annual report to the County Council on the following: 16 (a) Plans reviewed under this Section; (b) Late night businesses that have not submitted late night business safety plans; 17 18 (c) Recommendations for the improvement of late-night business safety; 19 (d) Grants provided under this Section; and 20 (e) Crime data for the area of each late-night business before and after the approval of a late 21 night business safety plan for the business. 22 SECTION 2. BE IT FUTHER ENACTED that the Department must promulgate and 23 submit proposed regulations to the Council for review within 180 days after this Act becomes 24 law. Within 90 days after notice of the approved regulations is published in the County Register, 25 each Late-Night Business must submit a proposed Late-Night Business Safety Plan to the 26 Department for review. The County Executive, or their designee should make a good faith 27 attempt to notify each affected Late-Night Business of its obligation to submit a proposed safety 28 plan. 29 SECTION 3. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that the provisions of this Act are hereby 30 declared to be severable; and, in the event that any section, subsection, paragraph, subparagraph, 31 sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Act is declared invalid or unconstitutional by a court of
