Highlights

Y.E.S Center

A new Drop-in Center which launched August of 2023 in partnership with the Circuit Court to support youth exiting foster care with transitioning into adulthood.

AFFIRM

Earned the highest tier of recognition by All Children All Families for services provided to LGBTQ youth.

YHDP

Awarded 1.79M per year to expand the County's comprehensive, youth-driven, coordinated system of care for youth experiencing homelessness in the County.

SRAP

Launched a \$1M Senior Rental Assistance Pilot that will provide financial assistance to seniors 65+ who have lived in the County for at least 5 years who are experiencing a rental hardship.

Medical Assistance & QHP Enrollment

13,379 new enrollments giving more county residents critical access to the medical care they need to thrive



Highlights

Maryland Money Market

Mobile food market increased access to fresh fruits and vegetables for SNAP/EBT recipients a dollar-for-dollar match in Money Market currency up to \$10/household

Community Garden

Collaboration with communities with high concentrations of food insecurity to help set up community gardens by providing tools, seeds, setup and support for the first year and build community capacity to sustain after our assistance has ended.

Summer SNAP

Provided \$1,209,958.39 in food benefits on behalf of 10,000 children during the summer to reduce hunger and poverty during non-school months

Corner Store Initiative

Partnership with 3 small stores to stock healthier foods and co-host inperson nutritional classes that teach residents how to prepare - and benefit from - those foods.

Recent Accomplishments

► HEALTHY FAMILIES AMERICA

Evidence based program funded with Title IV-E Family First Prevention Services federal funding to create additional slots specifically for pregnant and parenting youth in care that cultivate and strengthen nurturing parent-child relationships and promote healthy childhood growth and development.

► FQHCs

Initiative to ensure continuity of health care for vulnerable children and youth by partnering with 3 Federally Qualified Health Clinics to expedite primary medical care appointments for children removed from home by CPS and newly placed children in foster care.

► YOUTH ACTION BOARD

A decision-making body of youth and young adults (YYA) with lived experience of homelessness tasked with implementing ideas, suggestions, and solutions locally, statewide, and nationally.

► SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The agency provides intensive case management to students in selected high risk middle schools to foster family stability and reduce barriers to student achievement.

► TRAUMA INFORMED JOURNEY

Partnership with Paths for Families to provide critical trauma informed training to 1,600 child and family-serving professionals countywide and create systemic changes in care through comprehensive training and coaching to deepen the understanding of primary and secondary traumatic experiences for clients, professionals, and the organizations that serve them.

CROSSOVER YOUTH

1st county in Maryland to implement a Crossover Youth Practice Model (CYPM), that uses a "One Court-One Youth" model to reduce youth detention and reduction in recidivism

Upcoming Opportunities



Prevention Demonstration Project

Continuum of Care selected as a HHS Runaway and Homeless Youth Prevention Pilot site with a special focus on LGBTQ youth and Immigrant youth



Continuum of Care has embarked on a 12-month planning process to develop the County's new 10 year plan to prevent and end all homelessness. The system assessment phase is wrapping up and phase 2 planning will launch at the end of January 2024.





Families First Prevention Statewide Planning

In October, Maryland launched its statewide collaborative planning process with key partners to develop Maryland's five-year strategic direction for its child welfare system. Our goal is to support families to care for and meet the needs of their children in community, prevent child abuse and neglect and foster care entry, and improve outcomes for children and families that do enter the foster care system.

Built for Zero

Built for Zero is a network of more than 100 communities across the country, coordinated by and receiving technical assistance from Community Solutions. Communities in Built for Zero focus on achieving functional zero for one population, as a step on the way toward solving

homelessness for all populations. Prince George's County joined Built for Zero in 2023 and has identified achieving functional zero unsheltered homelessness by the end of 2025 as our first goal towards solving homelessness for all populations..





Transition Centers

Working system-wide to transform facilities that house men, women, youth and families experiencing an episode of homelessness in the County.
