




AHB Appointments



PAB At Work: 2024 Q1 Highlights

The PAB had a very active first quarter. Some highlights:

- **February 13, 2024** A new Program Administrator, Ebony Rorls, was onboarded, replacing Denise Hall, who retired. A Policy Analyst and General Clerk were also added, increasing the number of PAB staff to 5.
- February 29, 2024 the Board sent a letter to Delegate Taylor (District 23) in response to her request for support of the Anne Arundel County PAB's proposed amendments to the State of Maryland Code to improve Police Accountability
- March 7, 2024 PAB Staff joined other Maryland PABs and LEAs for a Summit organized by the Governor's Office of Crime Prevention & Policy and the Police Executive Research Forum (PERF)
- March 27, 2024—The Board hosted a community event, and attendees learned about the complaint process, current reforms, and the future of policing in Prince George's County.
- April 5, 2024- Board Member Keenon James met with Chief Bowers with the Greenbelt PD


Chiefs Meeting
