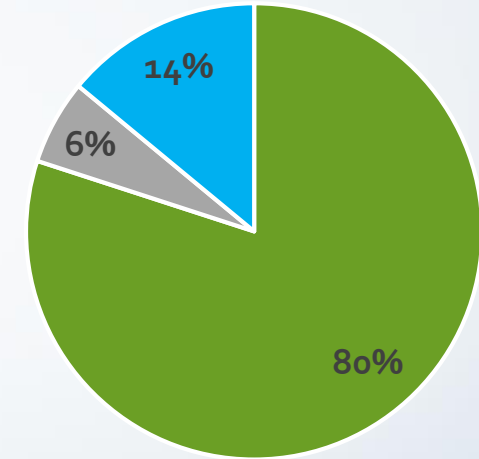
# Detainee or Inmate

- All arrestees come through Regional Processing
  - Approximately 18,313 detainees came through Regional Processing in 2019
  - Served 9,752 warrants in FY 19
- Everyone must see District Court Commissioner after arrest
  - Commissioners work around the clock to determine probable cause and bond
  - Approximately 8,231 people were committed to the jail by commissioner in 2019
  - This is a decrease of more than 1,300 inmates compared to 2018
- Inmates must see a judge the following business day for a bond review
  - Judge can raise, decrease or keep the bond the same

# Population Management

- Classification
  - Minimum Security
  - Medium Security
  - Maximum Security
  - Approximately 6,536 inmates were classified in FY 19
- Approximately 742 inmates as of February 3, 2020
  - Approximately 95% male and 5% female
  - There are 5 juveniles, who are being charged as adults
  - Majority are pre-trial
  - Sentenced individuals received 18 months or less
- Pretrial Release
  - Case management/Drug Screenings
    - 4,520 drug screenings were conducted on defendants in FY 19
  - Electronic monitoring
    - 114 defendants on electronic monitoring in FY 19

# Securing the Facility

- There are 18 housing units and a medical infirmary
  - General Population
  - Disciplinary Unit
  - Administrative Segregation
  - Female
  - Juvenile
- Approximately 447 sworn officers with various responsibilities
  - Regional Processing Officers
  - Housing Unit Officers
  - Emergency Response Team Members
  - K-9 Officers
  - Central Control Officers
  - Internal Affairs Officers
  - Command Staff



# Programs Available for Inmates

- Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) Program
  - 161 individuals have gone through the MAT program
- Domestic Violence Program
  - Assisted 110 individuals in FY 19
- Women's Empowerment Program
  - Assisted 94 individuals in FY 19
- Religious Services and Counseling
  - 1,179 hours of religious services in FY 19
  - 234 crisis counseling sessions in FY 19
- Barber Styling School
  - 13 students completed program in FY 19
- Education Unit
  - 12 people earned their GED in FY 19
- Juveniles in Adult Correctional Systems (JACS)
  - 25 juveniles went through the program
- Library Services
  - 16,531 requests processed by law library
  - 8,845 leisure books circulated



# Community Corrections

- Community Release Center (CRC) opened in November of 2018
  - Assists non-violent offenders with smoother transition into community
  - More than 80 people have been housed at CRC
- Community Service Program saw a total of 21,088 hours of work completed
  - Resulted in more than \$240,000 in cost savings for the County.
- Re-entry Services
  - Bridge Center
    - Collaborative reentry center hosted by the Health Department
    - Assists with health education, crisis intervention, job preparation, domestic violence treatment and substance abuse counseling

# Human Resources

- Development, Education and Training
  - Coordinates all aspects of the departmental training program
- Compliance
  - Oversees facility certification and accreditation and maintains the policies and procedures, post orders and the inmate handbook
- Actively Recruiting
  - Approximately 40 sworn vacancies and 41 civilian vacancies in FY 19
  - Recruiters attend career fairs, high schools, colleges, resource centers and community events
  - Minimum requirements are 18 years of age, possess valid driver's license and have a high school diploma

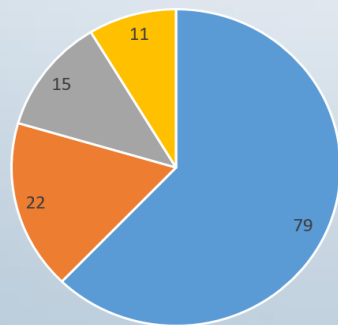




# Office of Professional Responsibility and Legal Affairs

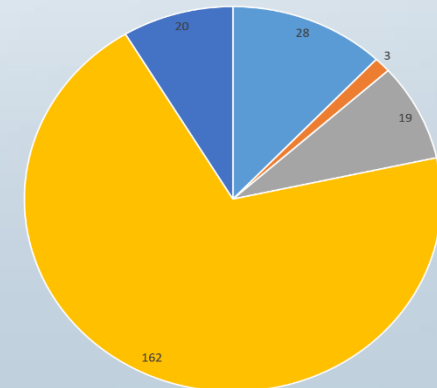
- Internal Investigations
  - Investigate allegations of policy violations
- Legal Affairs
  - Handles random drug screenings of staff, Public Information Act requests and Prison Rape Elimination Act investigations
- American with Disabilities Act (ADA)
  - Approximately 61 inmates received special care related to ADA in FY 19
  - Four courtesy rides were provided to those receiving ADA services in FY 19
- Special Investigations and Intelligence
  - Identifies potential criminal activity and assists with identifying gang members
