A RESOLUTIO	N concerning
	Recognition of Dr. Carter G. Woodson
For the purpose	of recognizing Dr. Carter G. Woodson as the Father of the Study of Black
History.	
WHEREAS	S, Dr. Carter G. Woodson, who was born on December 19, 1875 in New Canton,
Virginia, is recog	gnized as one of the first scholars to study the history of the African diaspora,
including Africa	n American History; and
WHEREAS	S, as a youth, Dr. Woodson, initially had to work in the coal mines near
Huntington, Wes	st Virginia, which left little time to embark on any formal education; and
WHEREAS	S, Dr. Woodson persevered and eventually enrolled in Douglass High School in
Huntington, whe	re he graduated in 1897; and
WHEREAS	S, Dr. Woodson would go on to obtain his Baccalaureate Degree in Literature
from Berea Colle	ege in Kentucky in 1903, his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts from the
University of Ch	icago in 1908, and his PhD in History from Harvard University in 1912, only
the second Afric	an American to earn a doctorate at Harvard, behind W.E.B. Du Bois; and
WHEREAS	S, convinced that the role of his own people in American history and in the
history of other of	cultures was being ignored or misrepresented among scholars, Dr. Woodson
realized the need	for research into the neglected past of African Americans; and
WHEREAS	S, in response to this need, he co-founded the Association of the Study of Negro
Life and History	, which is now called the Association for the Study of African American Life
and History (AS	ALH), on September 9, 1915; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Woodson's purpose as he put it was "to treat the records scientifically and to publish the findings of the world" in order to avoid "the awful fate of becoming a negligible factor in the thought of the world"; and

WHEREAS, in 1915, Dr. Woodson published "The Education of the Negro Prior to 1861", followed by the books entitled "Century of Negro Migration" in 1918 and "The History of the Negro Church" in 1927; and

WHEREAS, In January 1916, Dr. Woodson began publication of the scholarly *Journal of Negro History*, which never missed an issue, and in 2002, it was renamed the *Journal of African American History* and continues to be published by the ASALH; and

WHEREAS, Woodson described the purpose of the Association as the "scientific study" of the "neglected aspects of Negro life and history" by training a new generation of Black people in historical research and methodology. Believing that history belonged to everybody, not just the historians, Woodson sought to engage Black civic leaders, high school teachers, clergymen, women's groups and fraternal associations in his project to improve the understanding of Afro-American history; and

WHEREAS, because Dr. Woodson's tireless work in the endeavor of uplifting the African American race through scholarly pursuit perfectly aligned with its own Cardinal Principles, Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated elected Dr. Woodson as an honorary member in 1919; and

WHEREAS, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) awarded its prestigious Spingarn Medal to Dr. Woodson in 1926; and

WHEREAS, in 1926, Woodson pioneered the celebration of "Negro History Week", designated for the second week in February, which ultimately served as a precursor to its current iteration now nationally known as Black History Month; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Woodson died on April 3, 1950, at the age of 74 and is buried at Lincoln Memorial Cemetery in Suitland, Maryland.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Council of Prince George's County, Maryland, that in recognition of Dr. Woodson's exceptional body of work and accomplishments in the field of the historical study of the Black experience, Dr. Woodson is hereby recognized as the Father of the Study of Black History.
