FY 2026 County Aid Summary


- State aid to/on behalf of Prince George's County totals \$2.05 billion in FY 2026.
- Direct Aid increases by \$80.9 million, or 4.4%.
 - K-12 education aid increases \$89.9 million, or 5.6%.
 - Library aid increases by \$146,098, or 1.7%.
 - Community College aid increases by \$4.88 million, or 10.2%.
 - County aid decreases by -\$14.1 million, or -8.7%.


Drivers of K-12 Funding: Enrollment & Wealth Per Student


- County enrollment increases to 125,706.
- County wealth increases 6.4% in FY 2026 compared to the statewide average of 3.9%.
- The County ranks 15th on wealth per student, the same level for the past two fiscal years.



Drivers of K-12 Education Funding: Free and Reduced-Price Meals


- At 68.5% of enrollment, the County ranks 5th in the percent of enrolled students who qualify for free and reduced-price meals. The statewide average is 51.4%.
- FRPM student counts have remained at higher post-pandemic levels.






Drivers of K-12 Education Funding: English Language Learners


- The County continues to rank 1st in the number of students who are English Language Learners as a percent of enrollment.
- English Language Learner enrollment grew 6.0% statewide, versus 5.3% growth in Prince George's County.






Drivers of K-12 Education Funding: Special Education Services

- The County ranked 17th in the number of students who receive Special Education Services as a percent of enrollment.
- The September 2024 counts grew 4.2% in the County and 1.9% statewide.

County Aid Changes

- Highway User Revenues increase by 13.9% due to 2022 legislation that increases the County share from 4.3% of certain transportation revenues to 4.8% in FY 2026 and 2027;
- The Governor continued to fund a discretionary police aid enhancement in FY 2026;
- Disparity Grant funding decreases by -\$12.4 million (-17.9%) due to higher income tax growth per capita (2nd in the State). The disparity in 2026 is 67% of the statewide average, roughly the historical average for the County.
- The Governor is phasing-out the Supplemental Teacher Retirement Grant in HB 352; a 50% cut in 2026 and 100% in 2027. This was part of the deal when the Counties began paying teacher retirement costs at the 2012 session.

- The State makes payments directly to the State Retirement Agency on behalf of the County, paying a share of the retirement costs for teachers, community college and library personnel.
- Costs are rising in FY 2026 due to higher inflation and higher teacher raises due to the Blueprint funding.

Other Legislation

Budget Reconciliation and Financing Act SB 321/HB 352

• Governor Moore has proposed legislation that helps to balance the State's FY 2026 budget, by making changes in mandated formulas, transferring balances to the General Fund, etc.

• Revenues:

- HB 352 repeals the Teacher Retirement Supplemental Grant by FY 2027. The County loses \$4.8 million in FY 2026 and \$9.6 million in FY 2027 and beyond.
- For the income tax the Governor proposes eliminating itemized deductions and increasing the standard deduction; changing the rate to 4.7% for incomes from \$1 to \$100,000; and adding new brackets for income between \$500,001-\$1,000,000 (6.25%) and in excess of \$1,000,000 (6.5%).

Budget Reconciliation and Financing Act SB 321/HB 352

• Spending Impacts:

- The Governor proposes increasing the County share of the costs of the State Department of Assessments & Taxation, from 50% to 90%. This would cost the County \$2.6 million per year. This has been proposed multiple times by prior administrations but rejected.
- The County would have to pay a portion of Community College retirement costs for the first time (\$0.4 million) and part of the State share of teacher retirement (\$12.6 million), for a total of \$13.0 million.
 - The Department of Legislative Services is recommending that local governments pay the entire increase in State unfunded liability cost. If adopted, it would add \$12.6 million in additional spending to the County budget in FY 2026.
- The Board of Education would be asked to pay 40% of the excess for non-public special education placements (now 30%) in 2026 then 50% in 2027. The cost is estimated at \$3.9 million in FY 2026.
- If the proposal to defer collaborative time fails, the County would have to pay another \$15.3 million in FY 2026.

Excellence in Maryland Public Schools Act SB 429/HB 504

- The Governor has introduced education-related legislation to:
 - Revise funding definitions:
 - Target per pupil foundation amount: decreases amounts for FY 2026-2033 based on deferring collaboration for all teachers except special education
 - Collaborative time per pupil amount: delays increases in amounts until FY 2030
 - Special education per pupil amount: sets specific dollar amounts starting in FY 2026 rather than calculating by percentages, which maintains collaboration time for special education teachers.
 - Adjust funding:
 - Concentration of Poverty School Grant Program
 - Pauses increases in the proportion of the per pupil amount at the FY 2026 proportion for FY 2027 and 2028
 - Authorizes County Boards of Education for local school systems with at least 2 eligible schools to expend up to 50% of the program funds on behalf of these schools
 - Blueprint for Maryland's Future Fund
 - Includes the interest earnings of the Academic Excellence Fund to be included in the Fund

Excellence in Maryland Public Schools Act SB 429/HB 504

- The Governor has introduced education-related legislation to:
 - Establish new grants/initiatives:
 - Collaborative Time Innovation Demonstration Grant
 - National Teacher Recruitment Campaign
 - Maryland Teacher Relocation Incentive Grant
 - Academic Excellence Program and Academic Excellence Fun
 - Interstate Teacher Mobility Compact and Commission
 - Require the Department of Education to take certain actions:
 - Requires the Department to conduct a study of funding special education, an evaluation of the Concentration of Poverty School Grant Program, and consult with a national nonprofit to support the development of Grow-Your-Own Educators Grant Programs
